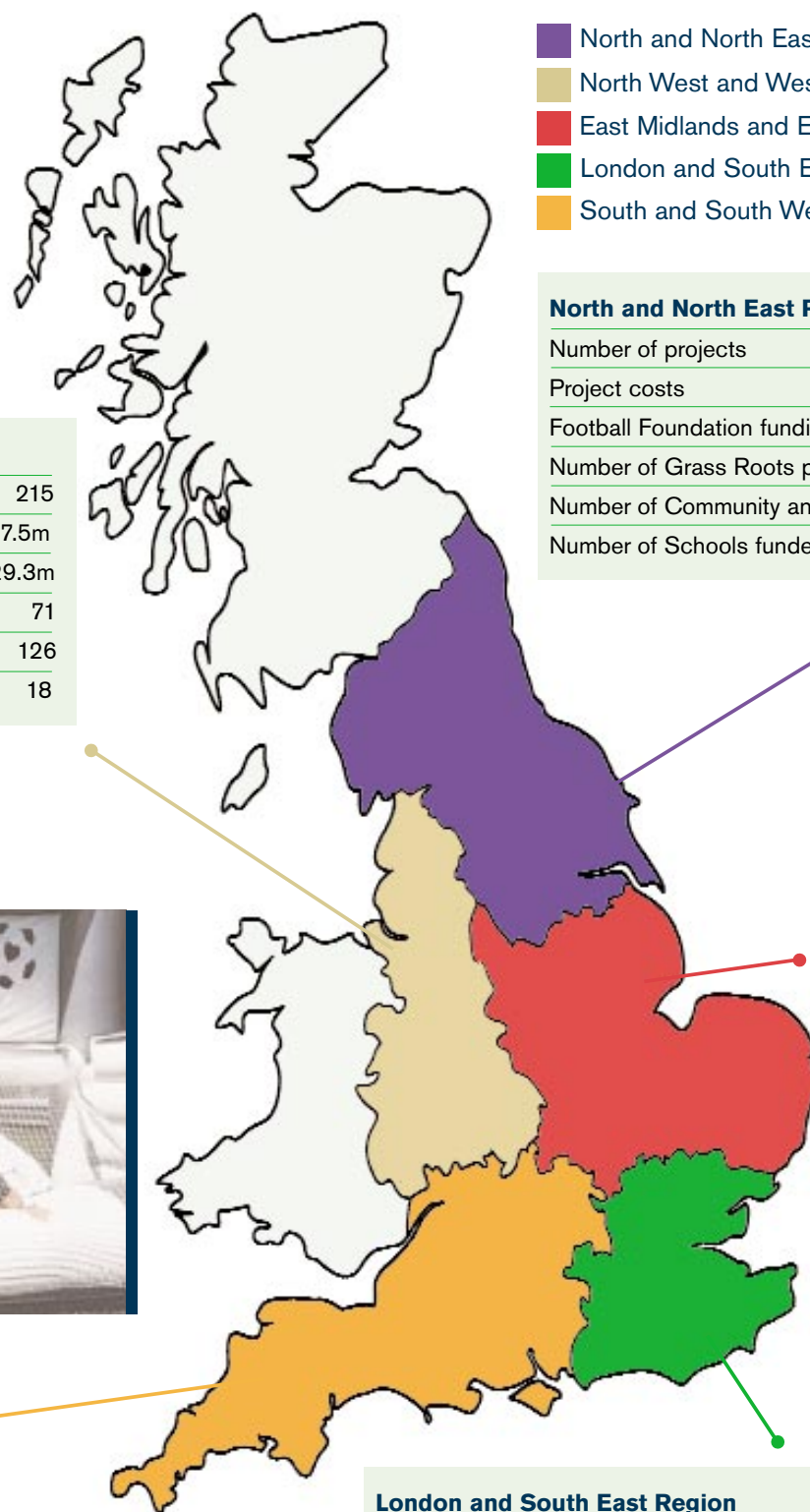

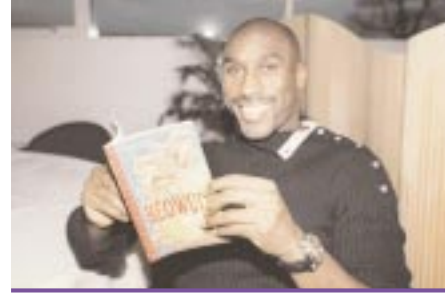
LONDON MARATHON PLAYING FIELDS SOCIETY

The London Marathon Playing Fields Society received a Foundation award of £510,000 for a new pavilion, housing changing rooms for both male and female players, seminar areas and social facilities. An additional £89,000 was provided to fund a dedicated football development officer to establish and support girls' football in the area. On average, over 1,600 young players a week now regularly use the site which also hosts girls'-only Mini-Soccer matches every weekend.



EVERTON FOOTBALL IN THE COMMUNITY DISABLED FOOTBALL SCHEME

The Foundation awarded Everton Football in the Community Scheme a grant of £147,000 to employ a football development officer, to bring the game within the reach of disabled youngsters. The scheme provides free, professional coaching and has created new after-school centres for hundreds of disabled players.



PREMIER LEAGUE READING STARS

Premier League Reading Stars sees top players encouraging football fans to read their favourite books and is a partnership between the Football Foundation, the National Literacy Trust and the Premier League, supported by Arts Council England. Each Premier League Club nominates a Reading Champion, who has selected his favourite book and reading groups then meet at local libraries to talk about their heroes' recommendations. 80% of the children taking part said the scheme had made them want to read more and 82% of adults on the project believed it had made their families talk more about reading.



MIDDLESBROUGH FC FOOTBALL IN THE COMMUNITY - FIT THROUGH FOOTBALL PROJECT

The Foundation provided a £148,920 grant for the Middlesbrough FC Football in the Community Programme for their 'Fit Through Football' initiative. The programme delivers a comprehensive healthy lifestyle programme, embracing positive lifestyle messages, drug awareness information, citizenship classes, physical activities, literacy and numeracy education as well as after-school coaching clubs for local children.



MILLWALL PARK

Millwall Park received a £302,000 grant from the Foundation and replaced run down shipping containers with a new pavilion housing nine modern changing rooms. The new facilities are now used as a site for an inter-schools league and benefit the wider sporting community, including rugby, cricket and the local George Green School.



WEST HAM UNITED ASIANS IN FOOTBALL PROJECT

The West Ham United Asians in Football Project received a £150,000 Foundation grant to extend opportunities and coaching for Asian youngsters in the area. The project is breaking down barriers between communities as well as developing personal skills and educational standards.



THE PRINCE'S TRUST

The Prince's Trust helps disadvantaged young people to overcome barriers and get their lives working. The Football Foundation has provided £818,000 to The Trust's Football Initiative. This personal development programme, which is supported by 65 Premier and Football League clubs, helps unemployed 16-25 year olds to develop their skills and confidence, whilst enabling them to gain recognised qualifications. More than 8,000 participants have now taken part, and over 75% of those who were previously unemployed have gone on into education or employment. IPSWICH BOROUGH COUNCIL

Ipswich Borough Council received a £1m grant from the Foundation for two new full size pitches, a new artificial turf pitch, as well as a new pavilion with male and female changing rooms at the Gainsborough Sports Centre. Thousands of women and girls have regularly used the site since it was opened.

POSITIVE FUTURES

Positive Futures, a national sport based social inclusion programme, is managed by the Home Office Drug Directorate in partnership with the Football Foundation, Sport England and the Youth Justice Board as well as three other Government Departments. It was initiated in 2000 and has so far helped over 50,000 marginalised 10 - 19 year olds into sport and on track to a brighter future. The Foundation has provided a further £3m investment programme to establish more local projects. Positive Futures works with children and families in socially disadvantaged neighbourhoods by creating opportunities to address the multiple issues associated with problematic substance misuse.
